Argyro Tataki was born in Athens in 1940. She graduated from the 6th Girls Public High School of Athens in 1958, from the Department of History and Archaeology of the School of Philosophy of the University of Thessalonike in 1963, obtained her M.A. degree from the University of Pennsylvania (Philadelphia, USA, Department of Classical Archaeology) in 1968 and her Ph.D. from the University of Thessalonike, Department of History and Archaeology of the School of Philosophy in 1987. She participated in the excavations of Vergina (1961, 1962), of Navarino Square (Thessalonike 1964-65) and of Mycenae (1964, 1965, 1971). She worked as a research assistant at the Archaeological Museum of Thessalonike (1964-65), at the University Museum of the University of Pennsylvania and of the Academy of Athens (1971). She extended her stay in the USA until the end of the dictatorship in Greece; during this period, among other occupations she taught at Universities of New York. On her return in Athens she worked for Ekdotike Athenon (1974-1980) as an author for a chapter of *The History of the Greek World* and of archaeological guides. From 1980 to 2007 she was a researcher at K.E.R.A.; in 2000 she became Director of Research. She collaborated for a series of years with the *Lexicon of Greek Personal Names*.

She was invited at the: Institut F. Courby (1983), Oxford University (1988, 1997, 2007), American Academy of Rome (1994), Hellenic Institut of Venice (1996, 2002, 2009), Kommission fur alte Geschichte und Epigraphik (1999) και Columbia University (2000). She was awarded by the Academy of Athens for her book *Ancient Beroea* (1989) and twice by the Fulbright Foundation (November 1990-January 1991, April-June 2000).

### Research interests

History, epigraphy, prosopography of Ancient Macedonia, study of the society and the history of names, archaeology.

### Other interests

Travels in places with historical and archaeological interest; she has repeatedly visited Egypt, Turkey, Syria, Jordan and has also travelled to Georgia, China, Cambodia, Libya, Argentina, Lebanon, Peru and Uzbekistan.
